Act Premium Full Version Silent Spring, modernized -- The widespread power of the pesticide industry stands in stark contrast to the mountain of evidence for its harm, which was viewed by many as a landmark book at the time of its release in 1962. When Rachel Carson's book first came out, the cotton industry was pushing pesticides that killed off bugs, weakening the plant and providing fewer clothes to sell in exchange for the meager profits. The produce industry was arguing for pesticides to treat food and protect it from bacterial contamination, which was the cause of diarrheal disease. After decades of worry that wide-scale pesticide use was causing environmental damage, scientists were beginning to suspect that even small amounts of pesticides were also harming other ecosystems. The public was learning that pesticides actually didn't kill off dangerous insects -- they just burned out of control and affected whole ecosystems. Many pesticides were also, according to the industry's wishful thinking, necessary to protect public health. The pesticide industry was beginning to realize that the near-unanimous public fear of their products was the reason they were one of the only industries that were shielded from regulation by the government, and that they needed to avoid getting on the wrong side of people who might actually be harmed by their products. They did not want to appear to be spraying toxic poisons in the air to kill off birds and insects, so they hoped to change the public perception of pesticides to the point where they could blame everything on people who objected.
